

# They're Back

## Four Tamarack alumni have returned to their old stomping grounds.

his is the greatest place on Earth." That was the response from four adults when asked to describe Tamarack Camps in Ortonville.

Jason Charnas, 31, of West Bloomfield; Rachel Ruskin, 31, of Birmingham; Carly Leipsitz, 27, of Farmington Hills; and Rabbi Jason Miller, 32, of Farmington Hills once roamed Camp Maas as campers and counselors. They journeyed on canoe trips, navigated ropes courses and trekked on hikes through the wilderness.

After a few years of absence, all four have returned as Jewish professionals and were roaming camp again last summer — this time zipping around in golf carts as they performed their daily jobs.

#### **JASON CHARNAS**

Jason Charnas was a true Tamarack kid. He worked two summers as staff in Brighton and eight in Ortonville as a teen service staffer, tripper, Camp Kennedy staff member and ropes supervisor. Charnas also interned as Tamarack's assistant director in 2001.

"I did everything here," he said. Yet it was the Western and Alaska trips

he went on as a camper that got Charnas hooked on Tamarack.

"My favorite camp memory is watching the sunset on Lake Superior on the last night of my Alaska trip," Charnas said.

Charnas said planning a trip to Israel taught him how to plan for long-distance trips such as the Western and Alaska.

Charnas' twin brother, Craig, has worked at Tamarack every summer since he was a teen service staffer (TSS) in 1994.

"Even when I staffed Teen Mission, I would tell Craig how jealous I was he was working here. Being away makes you realize how spectacular Tamarack is," Jason Charnas said.

But the real reason he returned?

"My love for Tamarack and camp in general," he said. "Spending a summer here is equal to spending a summer in Israel. You can wear shorts, T-shirts and flip-flops every day. What's better than

#### **RACHEL RUSKIN**

Seeing the smiles on kids' faces while they have a good time at camp is Rachel Ruskin's favorite part about her job.

Ruskin was a camper at Brighton in the early 1980s. For the next 15 years, she went on to be a camper, counselor, supervisor and assistant director at Young Judaea, the oldest Zionist youth movement in the United States.

Ruskin also traveled the country in 2002 as the director of Israel Scouts' Friendship Caravan and Israel Delegation. As director, Ruskin led a caravan of 17 Israelis who sang and danced at JCCs across the country, performing shows with educational messages about Israel.

In November 2005, Ruskin was named assistant director of Camp Maas. She

interviews and hires staff specialists and counselors, which includes traveling to Israel and England. Ruskin learns a lot about other cultures when traveling outside the U.S. to employ

"When you work overseas with another culture, you take that experience with you," she said.

More than anything, Ruskin values working with kids and spending time outdoors. While she never attended Tamarack as a camper, Tamarack has found a niche in Ruskin's life.

"The more familiar I became with Tamarack, the more I found it was a place where my values are also important values here."

Ruskin said she feels lucky to work at Tamarack. She loves when visitors come to camp and remark what a happy camp it is.

#### **CARLY LEIPSITZ**

Estate in Manhattan, N.Y., doing marketing and graphic design. After three years at Ripco, Leipsitz made her way back to Michigan — and Tamarack.

Leipsitz was appointed development associate in June 2007.

In that role, Leipsitz works with the marketing department at Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Detroit and conducts alumni relations. Leipsitz recently coordinated Alumni Family Fun Day at Tamarack and is working on upcoming alumni events in New York and Chicago. The goal of alumni events is to get the alumni connected to Tamarack again.

"I love planning the alumni events and bringing them back to this great place," Leipsitz said. "You hear the excitement, talking with someone who's at Tamarack who hasn't been connected with camp for 10 years."

Leipsitz stresses to alumni that Tamarack is going back to the way it was when they attended as campers.

"I think camp went away for a little bit, and it has really come to this great place that reminds me of when I was here," Leipsitz said. "The same activities like Fox Fire and Israel Day still go on."

Yet Tamarack has changed in some ways."We didn't have all those toys in the water or the climbing wall when I was here," Leipsitz said with a hint of

Like it has for many campers, Tamarack helped form Leipsitz's Jewish identity.

"I was very active in my Hebrew school, but coming to camp I learned to appreciate my Jewish identity," Leipsitz said. "I was a professional in a non-Jewish organization, but coming to work for a Jewish organization is so meaningful, and you understand why you're here."

Leipsitz said working for Tamarack is a dream come true.

"When I worked in New York, I had a job, and now I have a career."

#### **RABBI JASON MILLER**

Rabbi Jason Miller has grown up since his last summer at Tamarack 20 years ago. "I've experienced life, gotten married, had three children, traveled the world and been to Israel nine times. I have learned how to be a teacher and I have also been on a Jewish spiritual journey."

While he may have grown up, Miller fondly recalls the days he was a camper at Brighton from 1983-1986 and Ortonville from 1987-1989.

"I loved camp," Miller said. "I loved

playing sports, going on canoe trips and some of the friends I met at camp I am still friends with today."

Miller even officiated at the wedding of his Brighton bunkmate from that first summer he attended camp at age 7.

Miller noted he has Tamarack to thank for meeting his wife, Elissa. His and Elissa's family were regulars at family camp at the Butzel Conference Center.

"Twenty years ago, we were both at family camp with our respective families at the same time, having no idea we would later be married," he said

Miller earned a degree from James Madison College at Michigan State University prior to attending rabbinical school. He was ordained as a rabbi in 2004 at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York, where he also received a master's degree from the William Davidson School of Education.

#### **WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT YOUR JOB?**

"The opportunity for oneon-one conversations with campers and staff. Whether it's sitting under a tree with a 12-year-old practicing for his bar mitzvah or going for a long walk around the lake with a staff member on Shabbat, these opportunities are priceless."

"When I was in college, I was very involved in the Michigan State Hillel and was also teaching 10 hours a week of Hebrew school," Miller said. "These experiences — teaching and being a Jewish communal leader — led me to want to be a rabbi and to do that professionally."

As a camper, Miller had no plans to become a rabbi. "Becoming a rabbi was not on the radar screen at that time," he admitted. However, some of the leadership qualities he possesses were first formulated as a camper at Tamarack.

Before taking the job as Tamarack's rabbi on April 1, Miller was the rabbi for two years at Agudas Achim Congregation in Columbus, Ohio.

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
